California Community Colleges

The California Community Colleges is the system of higher education in the nation, consisting of 113 colleges located in California. They offer associate degrees, bachelor degrees, university transfer, vocational certificates and skill development.

San Diego Community College District is a multi-college district. This means that with one application you are admitted to all three colleges; Miramar College, City College and Mesa College.

The colleges offer guaranteed admission programs with many four year institutions, including the UC and CSU systems.

Intercollegiate sports offered district wide and over 400 student athletes compete across the state and nationwide.

The average annual in-state two-year college tuition in San Diego was \$ 3100 for tuition and books. In October 2017, Governor Brown signed Assembly Bill 19. This Bill created the California College Promise, a program providing free tuition for one year at California community Colleges for full-time students. The San Diego Promise will extend the program to some eligible students into their second year.

Many students are choosing to begin their education at community colleges for two years, taking advantage of the lowest cost. After satisfying required undergraduate courses they then transfer to a four-year institution to pursue a bachelor degree or higher education.

The San Diego Community Colleges offer Associate Degrees, Continuing Education and Career Technical Certificates that prepare students for transfer to universities and/or career pathways with higher paying jobs. In addition, Mesa College now offers a Bachelor's Degree in Health Information Management as part of California's Baccalaureate Pilot Program.

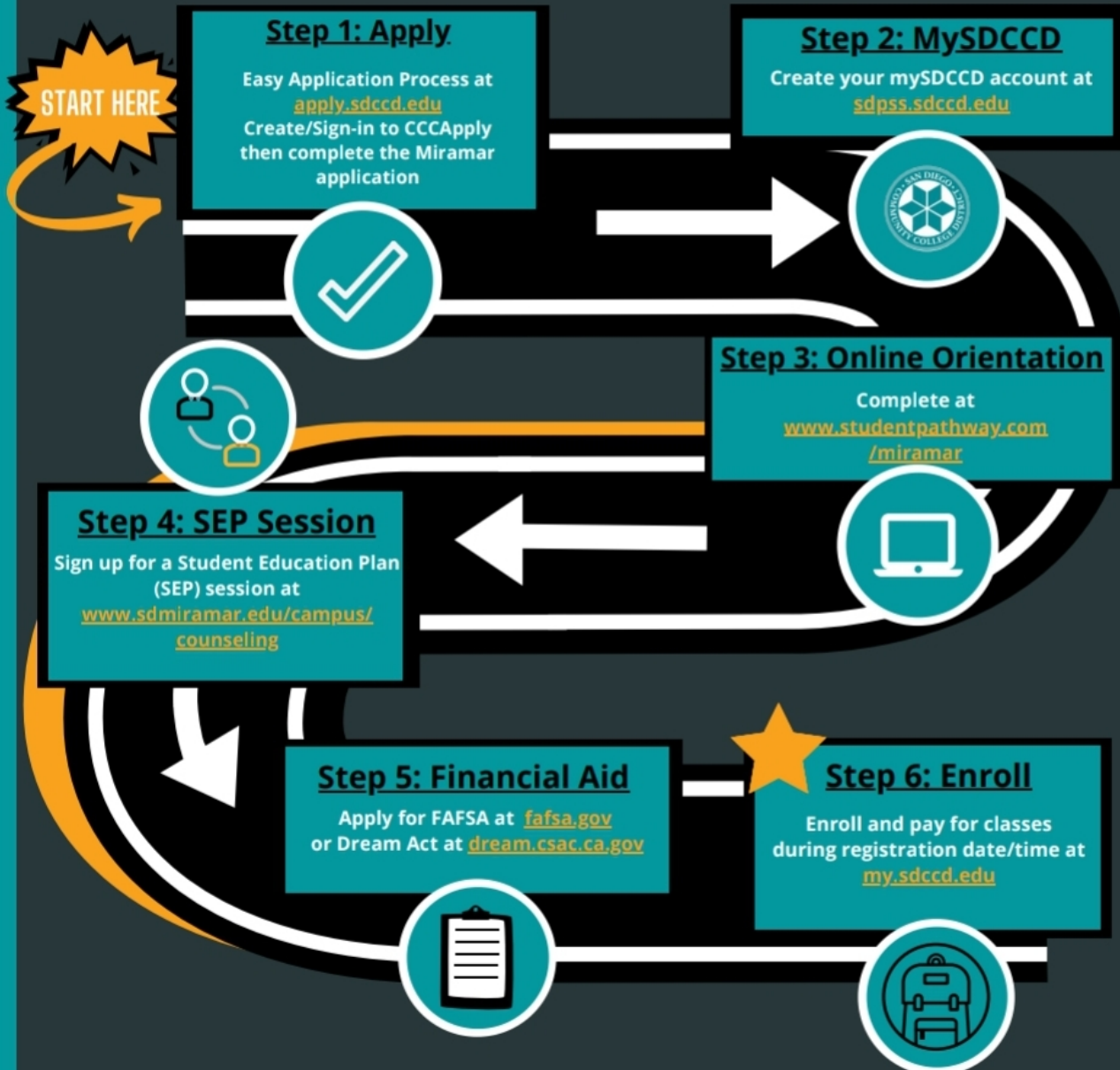
Tips for Applying to San Diego Community Colleges

When applying to SDCCD, things to be aware of:

- Website to apply is: <https://www.sdccd.edu/apply/>
- When you apply to Miramar, City or Mesa, it is all on one application-you only need to apply once to take classes at all 3 campuses.
- Students do not have to put in their Social Security Number (SSN) but it is highly recommended so we are able to track your application and connect your account with FAFSA. It is also needed if you are planning on saving the application and returning to it later. Errors will cause a significant delay for processing students.
- Students should select the college; Miramar, Mesa or City, you are most interested in going to or plan to take the most classes. For our presentation purposes, it is best to select Miramar.
- Enrollment Status: If you are planning to enroll as a full time student after high school graduation, students should answer this question as if you have already graduated high school. **You will select “New-1st time student-have never attended any college. 1st time college student”**. If you are a current high school student taking classes with the college part time, you can still say you are currently in high school.
- High School Graduation Status: Same as enrollment status. Graduating high school students will typically select “Received High School diploma”. Also note that students tend to forget to put the year graduated which is located in the right hand corner.
- Dependents: This is asking whether or not the applicant has dependents (children, sometimes grandparents, etc), not the total number of dependents in the household.
- Annual Family Income can be an estimate or simply select “Decline to State”.
- California Residency: If a student was born here in California they should put their birth date.
- Major: If major is not listed, select undecided. This is mainly for statistical purposes. Counselors will ask for major when meeting with students.
- If a student receives a validation error, that might mean they have already signed up with the school and have an application on file. They must contact Admissions (619-388-7844) to resolve this issue and update their file.

San Diego Promise (taken from MiraMar website – dates are geared for Fall 2020). Keep checking their website for up to date “deadline” information after the start of the new year, 2021.

PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS

Sign a Promise contract (electronically)

Attend a virtual Promise orientation

Enroll in at least 12 units by **August 31, 2020** (*Fall 2021 date TBD*)

Must maintain a 2.0 college GPA

Meet with a counselor each semester

Complete a comprehensive education plan by the end of your first year

HOW TO APPLY

Students that complete steps 1-4 by **June 11th** will receive priority registration and admission to the program.

Step 1: Complete a **Fall 2020** application for admission to City, Mesa, or Miramar College. (*You will need to complete Fall 2021 application.*)

Step 2: Complete a **2020-2021** FAFSA or California Dream Act application. (*You will need to complete 2021-2022 application.*)

School Codes for FAFSA or Dream Act applications:

- Mesa College: 001275
- Miramar College: 014172

Step 3: Complete a Promise application.

Step 4: After completing steps 1-3, we encourage you to continue the process of completing the new student online orientation and scheduling a counseling session to meet with a college counselor for an abbreviated education plan. Please contact the College Counseling Office for more information on the availability of virtual counseling appointments.

Step 5: Students that meet all program requirements and are eligible to participate in the San Diego Promise program will receive an invitation to electronically sign a Promise contract starting in [April 2020](#). The priority deadline to sign the Promise contract is [June 11, 2020](#). *(new date for 2021, TBD)*

IMPORTANT UPDATE: We will continue to accept and process Promise applications on a space available basis. If you submitted your application after [June 11, 2020](#) *(new date for 2021, TBD)* please allow 2-3 weeks for your application to be reviewed. Please be aware that your application will be used to determine eligibility into the program and does not guarantee acceptance.

Please note students that sign a Promise contract after [June 11, 2020](#) *(new date for 2021, TBD)* should be prepared to pay their enrollment and health fees out of pocket and will be reimbursed shortly after submitting a Promise contract.

Step 6: After you have signed an submitted your Promise contract, please expect to receive an email with an invitation to attend a virtual Promise orientation.

Note: Promise orientation vary by campus, information about your campus Promise orientation will e emailed to you after you have signed your Promise contract.

Step 7: Register for classes.

Financial Aid and Scholarships

Financial Aid

To apply for student financial aid from the federal government, including the Pell Grant, Perkins Loan, Stafford Loan and work-study, you will need to submit financial aid applications the most important of which is the **Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)**. The FAFSA application is found at <https://fafsa.ed.gov/>.

FAFSA DEADLINES: FAFSA can be submitted as early as October 1st. Financial aid applications, such as the FAFSA should be submitted as soon as possible after the date they open each year. To meet the deadlines for most states you should submit the form no later than June 30, 2021. NOTE: The deadline is midnight, central time. The earlier you file, the more grant money you are likely to receive (up to twice as much). Please be aware that for some colleges, the deadline is December 15 and March 1. Do not wait until your parents file their income tax returns with the IRS. You should estimate your income. You can change amounts later.

Scholarships

Scholarships are listed on NAVIANCE, the counseling website and on SRHS Foundation Counseling College Corner located at: <https://srhsfoundation.org/college-corner> . Check regularly and APPLY!

Check each school's deadline for Merit Scholarships. Some schools may only offer special scholarships to those who applied early action etc. **Be aware of deadlines!**

Be aware of companies that charge money for scholarship information. We recommend that you check the sources before ever spending any money! See your counselor if you have any questions.

Western Undergraduate Exchange (WUE)

California is a member of WICHE (Western Interstate Commission of Higher Education). 145 schools participate in the West. WICHE states include: Alaska, California, Colorado, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oregon, South Dakota, Washington and Wyoming. Out-of-state tuition is reduced giving students from WICHE states affordable access to programs that may not be available in their home state. It also provides students with a more diverse array of institutions in which to enroll.

Colleges that participate set aside a limited number of spots for students with a WUE tuition so students should apply early. Visit the website to see which colleges and majors qualify for WUE tuition.
